From your Rector

The church is dying. People have been saying that as long as I have been a member of the Episcopal Church. A lot of people think the decline began in the early 2000s, but it actually began in the 1980's. Church attendance hit an unprecedented high in the 1950's and early 1960's. Since a lot of people in our church remember that time, some people assume that the church was always that large and influential. The truth is that the 1950's and 1960's was a bit of an anomaly when it came to church attendance. Therefore, it might not be fair to compare where we are now to where we were then. People really didn't worry too much when we declined a little in the 1980's and 1990's.



However, in the early 2000s, people across the church started to notice. Churches lost staff because of budget cuts. Pews that were once full started to empty. A lot of people attributed this decline to the controversy over gay marriage and ordination. This controversy played a part as there was a lot of infighting and most people don't want to be part of a church that is always arguing about something. However, it was more than that. This decline had been brewing for decades.

In 2012, I took a month long sabbatical. I went to England to study a movement called Fresh Expressions. The Church of England was putting a lot of effort into new ways of being church. Examples include "messy church" that was geared to families with young children. They moved worship to the parish hall where children could work on projects as part of worship. There were churches that met in basements, bars, nightclubs, etc. The Church of England was very intentional about trying new things. There was an entire office dedicated to studying these trends and supporting people in these ministries. I met with some people and marveled at how much they had done. I asked why they were so far ahead of The Episcopal Church. The answer was simple. "You aren't desperate yet. But you will be soon." The Church of England had been declining much faster than the Episcopal Church. They knew that something had to be done. Therefore, they started working on intentional evangelism and formation in the 1990s. It has only been in the last 5 years when I have seen these discussions become more common in the Episcopal Church. It appears that we are getting desperate.

The question is what are we desperate for? Are we desperate to get more people in our pews? Are we desperate for the survival of our historic church? If those are the causes of our desperation, I fear we shall never be satisfied. I would like the church to come to a point when we are desperate for God. Pew Research did a recent survey that found the number one reason people went to church was to feel closer to God. It seems obvious, but we don't talk about it much. In the Episcopal Church we rarely talk about a relationship with God. I confess I worry about church attendance. My fear is not that people don't care anymore. I believe they do. My fear is that our worship isn't helping people feel closer to God. If that is true, I want to know. The only way I can know is if you tell me. I would love to know what makes you feel closer to God.

Sometimes to feel closer to God, we have to lay ground work outside of Sunday morning worship. People who have studied church growth have determined that one of the signs of a thriving church is bible study. It makes sense. The more you study God's word, the more invested you are in what happens on Sunday morning. While we have an ongoing bible study during the week, we plan to do things a little different for Sunday Morning Christian Formation. We have moved our Vacation Bible School to the Fall. The benefit is that adults will be able to participate. The theme of our Vacation Bible School is "Rome: Paul and the Underground Church." While the children and youth will be doing activities focused on Paul and the early church, the adults will also be studying Paul. (*continued on page 2*)

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We will be looking at some overarching themes of Paul's letters as well as his part in the early church. The church was persecuted in its first 300 years of existence. This meant that people often gathered in homes or small assembles. This provides an opportunity for more fellowship and participation.

On Sunday, September 23rd we will have our own underground church. We will meet at 5pm and will only reveal the location the week before. Don't worry, we will still have service in the morning. We thought it would be a good way to experience what early Christians experienced. I hope that you will consider participating in some of the activities around our Fall Vacation Bible School, especially the formation opportunities. If you cannot make it on Sunday morning and would like to have the study on a weeknight, let me know. I would love to make this available to as many people as possible. One of the things I am considering is offering the study online. Christian formation/education does not end your senior year of high school. It lasts a lifetime. I hope that through all of this, we will each find ways to draw closer to God.



for now! The location will be announced at a later date. Watch the bulletin and emails for more infor-


