From your Rector

Joshua was the successor to Moses. He brought the people into the Promised Land. In end of Joshua's life, he gathered the Israelites together, and gave them one final pep talk. As we know, the Israelites often had trouble deciding which god to follow. They tended to waffle back and forth. In his final speech, Joshua said, "Now if you are unwilling to serve the LORD, choose this day whom you will serve but as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD." You probably recognize that final line. It's catchy. There are a lot of little plaques/signs with those words. But it's more than just a slogan. It's about loyalty and identity.



For a long time, I identified as Roman Catholic. It was important to me. It was such a core part of my identity, that even when it no longer described my beliefs, I had a really hard time letting go of it. Intellectually, I know it didn't really matter what denomination I was. What mattered was that I was Christian. Around that same time I was struggling with those questions, I remember hearing a sermon where the minister said that it didn't matter who I was, it only mattered "whose" I was. Who did I belong to? I belong to God. As long as I could hold on to that, I would be ok. It would take five more years after hearing that to let go of my Roman Catholic identity.

One of my favorite parts of our baptismal liturgy is the very end. After the priest baptizes the individual, the priest anoints the new Christian with oil and says, "You are sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked as Christ's own forever." You are Christ's own. In the end (and by the end, I really mean the end), that is all that matters. All that matters is that you will be able to say that you are Christ's own. It won't matter what country you are from. It won't matter what college you graduated from. It won't matter what your last name is. It won't matter what language you speak. It won't matter what denomination you are part of or what church you belonged to. What will matter is that you will be able to say that you served the Lord and that you were one of Christ's own.

The election is around the corner. In the ads, people are being appealed to on the basis of their identity. It's our political party. Our gender. Our religion. How American/patriotic we are. I am not saying that does not matter. Of course it matters. But what really matters is who we belong to and who we serve. What matters most in our life? Is it that we are Christ's own (Christian) or is it something else? God is compassionate and loving. God also demands our loyalty. I know nobody like to think of our God as demanding, but according to the Bible, he is. I could provide dozens of passages where God demands to be worshipped. Thankfully, it goes both ways. God demands our loyalty because God will always be loyal to us. God will never give up on humanity. During this time when our loyalty is being questioned by politicians and our peers, imagine that instead, God is asking the question. How will you answer? It might be the most important question you ever answer.

The results will be shared through a series of listening meetings that will be held in November. The date will be announced in the Diocesan Newsletter and the bulletin.


Musical Notes




Early Church Marketplace October 14th 2018
