From your Assistant Rector...

It should be about midway through Lent when you read this article. So, how is your personal journey going this Lent? I was led to ask out of my own journey during Lent, and felt compelled to "check-in". As one of your ministers who is "to love and serve the people among whom you work" (BCP, p.531), please know I am here to help and support you in your journey closer to God.



This Lent also reminded me that many Protestant churches are made up of people from an amalgam of Christian backgrounds, and by getting to know each other we deepen our collective faith. This blend of Christian culture makes me think of it like adding instruments to an orchestra to create a richer, fuller sound. However, faith like music can become a cacophony of noise unless there is some mutual understanding and trust. In music, it takes sheet music, lead musicians, and a conductor to turn sounds into symphonies. Likewise, our formation requires more than just the words of Holy Scripture and our Book of Common Prayer; we need those who come alongside us to help guide us in our shared journey to deepen our faith and grow closer to God. Lent is a fitting time to consider that diversity because of the dynamic way Lent has been celebrated over the last 2 millennia.

Early Christians observed "a season of penitence and fasting" (BCP, p.265) in preparation for the Paschal feast or Easter (Paschal is from the Hebrew word "Pesah" meaning Passover). Our season of Lent (from an Old English word Lencten meaning "spring") has a long history. Originally, in places where Pascha was celebrated on a Sunday, the Paschal feast followed a fast of up to two days. In the third century this fast was lengthened to six days. Eventually this fast became attached to, or overlapped, another fast of forty days, in imitation of Christ's fasting in the wilderness. Over time, the period of days over which the forty fasting days occurred varied along with what was considered "fasting".

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays (the days to fast remains dynamic). The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. Today Lent has reacquired its significance as the final preparation of adult candidates for baptism. Joining with them, all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word" (BCP, p. 265)

By "observing a holy Lent" we practice and seek habits that lead us closer to God. Jeremiah tells us: "When you search for me, you will find me; if you seek me with all your heart, I will let you find me, says the Lord" (29:13-4 NRSV). As we seek God, God seeks us and the distance between us is shortened. Lent is a time to close the gap on our end, knowing God is waiting to do the same.

I encourage you to follow the good examples of those who have gone before us, learn from those ahead of us, and walk alongside others who share our journey. In doing that we strengthen our own faith and are better prepared to help and support those who come after us learn about God's love. In the corporate observance of Lent, we share our journey and help build up the whole body of believers. The whole body is like

"a full, faith filled orchestra performing a beautiful symphony", and as Luke 15:7 notes: "I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents..." (continue to page 2)


Palm Sunday Worship: On April 14th at the 8am and 10:30am services, we will follow the traditional liturgy of the palms with our outdoor procession around the church to begin the service. This year, the service will begin in the parish hall. The service will conclude with the Passion narrative read by individuals and congregation as we carry the cross out to the cemetery and leave in silence.

Tenebrae Service: The word Tenebrae means "darkness" in Latin and the approaching darkness of last three days of Holy Week. The service points to three things: First, the psalms and readings tell of the darkness that presses upon us all from living in a broken world. Second, we hear Lamentations and remember the heaviness of any misfortunes from the past year. Third, we'll hear readings of the new dawn, in which God will reign victorious over darkness and death: "The sunrise from on high will dawn upon us!" reminding us that sin and death *do not* have the final word. Join us on Wednesday, April 17th at 7pm.

Maundy Thursday Worship: Our Maundy Thursday service on April 18th at 7pm, will include foot washing and the celebration of the Lord's Supper. This year, special prelude music will be offered by a quartet of trombones. The somber notes of Lenten chorales on these low brass instruments will set the tone for our holy service. The service will conclude with the stripping of the altar and all leaving in silence.

Good Friday Worship: On Friday, April 19th at 12pm, our Good Friday service will follow the Prayer Book liturgy with psalms, readings, prayers and suffrages.

Good Friday Walk with the Cross: St. John's will be joining nine other local churches to journey around downtown Hampton. We will move to different stations and share scripture and song. We begin at 5pm at First Baptist and conclude at St. John's.

<u>Did you know?</u> The Easter egg is a symbol of Jesus' resurrection - a baby chick emerging from the shell is symbolic of Jesus emerging from his tomb on Easter Morning.



Adult Forum

Our seven Adult Forums ties the Easter Vigil readings to the seven practices of the Way of Love. Drawing on the ancient practice of setting aside Lent as a period of study and preparation for living as a Christian

disciple (known as the catechumenate), the forums encourage participants to reflect on salvation history; walk toward the empty tomb; and embrace the transforming reality of love, life, and liberation. As we stand with the three women at the empty tomb, we hear his call to go and live that transformed reality.






